Wednesday Mass

The regular Wednesday morning parish Mass will shortly be moved to Wednesday afternoon. The change is planned to take place at the end of August.

The Wednesday morning Mass has not been particularly well attended, especially during the winter. But my apologies to those to whom this change may be inconvenient. However there are three main reasons for the change.

The first is to offer a weekday Mass at a time that parents with children in St Nicholas school may be able to attend.

The other is to better accommodate the needs of St Nicholas School. On average, twice a month children from the school will attend this afternoon Mass.

Thirdly I need to free up some time in my schedule for additional work outside of the parish - and it will be very helpful to make one morning a week available for this.

In addition, every once in a while I meet people who say that our regular morning time is a bit early for them, especially if they are getting the bus to church.

So hopefully the new arrangements will prove popular, but again apologies to any they may not suit.

Do Justice

is an invitation to members of the parishes of Catholic Sutton Coldfield to deepen their commitment to being, as Pope Francis said at the end of the synod in Rome in October 2023, "a more synodal and missionary Church, a Church that adores God and serves the women and men of our time, going forth to bring everyone the consoling joy of the Gospel"

Do Justice is a process promoted by Caritas Social Action Network (CSAN), an agency of the Bishops' Conference dedicated to addressing poverty and injustice in England and Wales.

Inspired by the love of God for all people, CSAN operates as a member of *Caritas International*, the global expression of charity within the Catholic Church, spanning over 160 countries.

Do Justice is grounded in the Christian principles embodied by the first Christians, motivated by the love of the risen Christ to become ambassadors of reconciliation and strive for a world of peace and justice.

The *Do Justice* process for our Cluster is based around 3 meetings to be held in The Newman Centre at St Nicholas parish, Boldmere, B73 5US from 4.30pm to 6pm on Sundays 29th September and 6th and 13th October.



A man came from Baal-shalishah, bringing Elisha, the man of God, bread from the first-fruits, twenty barley loaves and fresh grain in the ear.' 'Give it to the people to eat', Elisha said. But his servant replied, 'How can I serve this to a hundred men?' 'Give it to the people to eat' he insisted 'for the Lord says this, "They will eat and have some left over."' He served them; they ate and had some left over, as the Lord had said.

Psalm 144(145):10-11,15-18

All your creatures shall thank you, O Lord, and your friends shall repeat their blessing. They shall speak of the glory of your reign and declare your might, O God.

The eyes of all creatures look to you and you give them their food in due time. You open wide your hand, grant the desires of all who live.

Ephesians 4:1-6

John 6:1-15

Jesus went off to the other side of the Sea of Galilee – or of Tiberias – and a large crowd followed him, impressed by the signs he gave by curing the sick. Jesus climbed the hillside, and sat down there with his disciples. It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover.

Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, 'Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?' He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks, and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal
